

Parsha




- Top: **Nina** learns the bracha that is said upon seeing a rainbow. She matches each word to its translation (e.g., ata=you).

Midda of the Week



This week, as part of our weekly middos curriculum, Bnos Aliya learned about *derech erez leachila* (the proper way to eat). We discussed and demonstrated the way a Jew should sit down to eat.

Halacha Yomi

Bnos Aliya began their study of Halacha Yomi with *hilchos sederhayom* (laws relating to a daily routine and basic activities). Jews can demonstrate love for Hashem by paying attention to the details of the day. Below are some points we discussed...

- When a person wakes up in the morning he/she should wash negelvasser: washing each hand 3-4 times. Before washing negelvasser, one should not touch any openings from the body. Thenegel vasser water is then disposed of as the water is now tamay(impure).
- After using the bathroom, one should wash his/her hands and *sayasher yatzar*.
- It is *assur* (forbidden) for a boy to walk 4 *amos* (approximately 8 feet) without wearing a kippa.
- One should put on and take off the right shoe first and then the left. The left shoe should be tied first, followed by the right. (If one is left-handed then he/she does the opposite.)
- When taking off shoes, one should remove the left shoe first.
- It is a Torah mitzva to make kiddush on wine Friday night, while on Shabbos day the mitzva is Rabbinic.
